COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a beginning course for non and limited English proficient students who want to acquire the communication skills necessary for living, working, and attending school where English is used. Integration of computer literacy, such as basic computer knowledge and keyboarding will help students build the basic skill set needed in the workplace, in school, and other aspects of their daily lives.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to demonstrate the following measurable skills and abilities:

- 1. Identify numbers, letters of the alphabet, and basic sight words, through listening, speaking, repetition, dictation, writing, and keyboarding.
- 2. Demonstrate comprehension of verbal commands through appropriate physical response.
- 3. Ask and respond to simple questions with words, phrases, or short sentences in a verbal interaction and when completing a simplified written form.
- 4. Discriminate between present and future actions
- 5. Interpret sentences using vocabulary and structures previously learned orally
- 6. Comprehend words, phrases, statements, and questions related to familiar content such as personal information or everyday life and activities.
- 7. Read and comprehend short stories and informational articles accompanied by

corresponding pictures.

- 8. Ask for clarification and repetition during verbal interactions to check understanding.
- 9. Produce vowel and consonant sounds and relate those sounds to letters and clusters of letters.
- 10. Recognize and use basic punctuation including end marks, apostrophes, commas, and hyphens correctly in copying sentences.
