





VCCCD FTES





VCCCD 2017-2018 Sections

¹ Districts with high fee waivers as a percent of FTES and awards as a percent of Credit FTES generally display greater funding outcomes under the proposed new formula.

² For San Francisco CCD, the Old Formula amount reflects the removal of the stability adjustment pursuant to Education Code 84750.6. The New Formula amount for San Francisco CCD reflects a stability adjustment consistent with the application of stability for all districts.

³The 2016-17 Cost-of-Living Adjustment percentage for the applicable Hold Harmless provision is 0%.

Proposed Funding Formula Observations, Issues and Questions

DOF simulation does not use data that is established in the Trailer Bill. For example, 2017-18 should be used for base year but DOF is using 2015-16. DOF simulation also uses 2016-17 P2 FTES and 2015-16 for Pell, BOG and Degrees/Certificates but Trailer Bill language says to use 2017-18 Advance FTES and 2016-17 for Pell, BOG and Degrees/Certificates.

DOF simulation uses a 3-year cohort for Pell, instead of annual district numbers as listed in the trailer bill. This methodology significantly dilutes the count and substantially reduces the commensurate funding level.

BOG can be duplicated by College or unduplicated by District. Preference is to duplicate so that each college gets credit, and funding can be allocated by college. For example, 3 colleges in a multi-college district—count student 3 times if they attend each campus versus one time as a District count.

Proposed Funding Formula Observations, Issues and Questions (continued)

Why is the 2017-18 Credit/FTES rate not increased by the Base Funding from \$5,072 to \$5,320 as referenced in the Trailer Bill?

The DOF calculation that was released uses FY 2015-16 data. Alternatively, if current data is used it appears the increased cost to the entire system is near \$800 million. How would this increase be funded?

The Formula should be developed in 2018-19 and Implemented in 2019-20. This will provide ample time to fine-tune the formula and give districts time to plan since Tentative Budgets are being developed now for May 2018.

New funding formula potentially sets up many districts for immediate failure, to be followed by a cycle of decline that may be difficult to recover from.

Why is the Basic Allocation not increased by COLA? COLA funding is not allocated to the "hold harmless" districts. In turn, fiscal stability for these districts will be at risk. These districts would not receive any new revenue, while operating costs increase on-the-natural.

Change of this magnitude needs time to be vetted and tested to ensure a successful implementation for the System. Four months for the new formula is not enough time. SB 361 took 2.5 years to vet and implement.

Proposed Funding Formula Observations, Issues and Questions (continued)

The proposed model is intended, in large part, to move to performance based funding. However, it actually decreases funding for 9 of the top 15 districts with the highest completion rates. If the interest is in rewarding high performance, the weights should be adjusted between the factors to do so.

The Formula disproportionately weights metrics that will cause wide swings in year-to-year funding. Dropping allocation percentages from 25% to 10% should be considered.

The proposed model radically overweights completion in three years, which creates a huge disincentive to serve the population the Governor is concerned about—working adults.

Non-Credit students are not represented although they are a large population at many districts, and are often low income. This means the BOG waiver metric is not capturing all low-income students.

Summer Shift should not be eliminated after 2018-19. Shifting FTES can provide needed flexibility for colleges to serve students and align revenues with expenses.

Replacing the current three-year stability methodology to a one-year model should be rethought to ensure that District's won't experience large year-to-year decreases in revenue.
