#### **CLERY ACT DECISION MATRICES**

This training bulletin is intended for Department supervisors and discusses the *Clery Act* requirements for documenting the decision-making process for issuing Timely Warnings and Emergency Notifications.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

When a *Clery Act* crime occurs, institutions are required to determine whether students or employees are at risk of becoming victims of a similar crime, and if so, must issue a Timely Warning. The *Clery Act* further requires institutions to issue Emergency Notifications whenever an incident occurs that would have an immediate threat to the health or safety of on-campus community members (20 USC § 1092 & 34 CFR § 668.46).

Incidents that may warrant a Timely Warning or an Emergency Notification must be evaluated on an individual basis. Whenever a *Clery Act* crime is reported to a Campus Security Authority (CSA; includes all VCCCD Police Department employees), or a hazardous event occurs, a District official must make a determination if a Timely Warning or Emergency Notification is warranted. The VCCCD Timely Warning Decision Matrix and the VCCCD Emergency Notification Decision Matrix aim to assist officials in gathering all available information to take into consideration when determining if a serious or continuing threat exists.

#### PROCEDURES FOR TIMELY WARNINGS

Whenever one (or more) of the following *Clery Act* crimes are reported, a VCCCD Police Department supervisor (or other District official) must complete a VCCCD Timely Warning Decision Matrix form and submit the completed form to Police Services.

#### **Clery Act Crimes:**

- Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter
- Negligent Manslaughter
- Sex Offenses
  - Rape, Sodomy, Penetration by a Foreign Object
  - Fondling / Sexual Battery
  - o Incest
  - Statutory Rape
- Robbery
- Aggravated Assault
- Burglary
- Motor Vehicle Theft

- Arson (fires investigation by law enforcement and deemed to be arson)
- Hazing

**Hate Crimes, Including the Category of Bias** (i.e., Race, Religion, Sexual orientation, Gender, Gender Identity, Disability, Ethnicity, and National Origin):

- Any of the above crimes, plus:
  - Simple Assault
  - Larceny/Theft
  - o Intimidation
  - Damage, Destruction, or Vandalism of Property (motivated by bias)

#### **Violence Against Women Act:**

- Stalking
- Dating Violence
- Domestic Violence
- Sexual Assault

#### Arrests:

- Liquor Law Violations (not including under the influence)
- Drug Law Violations (not including under the influence)
- Weapon Law Violations

#### PROCEDURES FOR EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

Whenever one (or more) of the following immediate threats are reported, a VCCCD Police Department supervisor (or other District official) must complete a VCCCD Emergency Notification Decision Matrix form and submit the completed form to Police Services.

#### Immediate Threats include (but are not limited to):

- Terrorist Attack
- Active Shooter
- Natural Disaster (e.g., earthquake, tsunami)
- Environmental (e.g., smokey air, extreme weather, gas leak)
- Other Any immediate threat deemed hazardous to the health or safety of the community


